No, it's not Christmas already. 'Tis the season when we celebrate the Protestant Reformation ... the seminal series of events sparked by the publication of Luther's 95 Theses that changed the face of at least western civilization, and arguably the entire world.</p> <p>And as you know, this year it's a big deal, because the 95 Theses were published on (probably) October 31 in (definitely) 1517. If you do the math, you'll notice that's 500 years ago. It's kind of a big anniversary.</p> <p>So we'll celebrate, especially on Reformation Sunday (October 29) our heritage as a Reformation church. We'll sing good old hymns from our Lutheran cultural and ethnic heritage; we'll recall the series of events, theological and cultural and political, that moved Christianity away from the excesses and the corruption Luther saw in the church of his day; and I'll probably even quote some German theologians other than Luther in the sermon that morning.</p> <p>In fact, as I'm considering how we'll look back at the Reformation, I'd even like to encourage you to remember your own journey to the Lutheran church. What images are in your memory? Which pastors were influential, either positively or negatively? Are you a cradle Lutheran? If not, at what age did you come to the Lutheran church? What do you remember about the church from ten years ago? twenty? forty? what about seventy years ago?</p> <p>And, of course, as I think about what the church was like over the past few decades, I can't help but to wonder what it was like to be Lutheran in the 1860s, when my ancestors came to this country; or what the church was like in 1640 when Reorus Torckillus, the first Lutheran pastor to come to this land, arrived; or, what was it like to be one of the very first Lutherans in the decades just after Luther died, and when the world was politically and religiously tumultuous.</p> <p>***</p> <p>I hope you noticed what I tried to do. I've done my best in this article to push your thinking backward in time. I've done that intentionally, because that's often how a lot of people think about the Reformation.
